PRESIDENT

HARRY EVISON

HARRY EVISON, B.A., is a rehab. student doing History Honours and has been Secretary of the Association since June, 1948. He first attended Victoria in 1941 and enlisted in the RNZAF the following year. He returned to NZ late in 1945 and spent two years in Wellington Training College, where he was Chairman of the Debating and Tramping Clubs, active in drama, and editor of "Student Opinion" and "Ako Pai." His chief joys in sporting are mountaineering and ski-ing.

He has definite ideas on Association affairs and policy. and Building Fund Appeal Committees; Member of Common Room, Gymnasium, Liquor Regulations and Constitution Committees; VUC Delegate NZUSA Annual Conference; VUC representative NZUSA Congress Committee; and VUCSA representative to the Price Tribunal. He has also been active on several Club Committees.

He has definite ideas on Association affairs and policy. He stands for maximum possible support and assistance to all College Clubs, both financial and otherwise; but he also wants more attention paid to the needs of students outside of club activities, particularly in hostel, cafeteria, and Common Room accommodation. He is at present working on a scheme with the co-operation of the College authorities, for provision of a comfortable joint Common Room for men and women. He also believes that important decisions affecting Association policy should be made by General Meetings of the Association rather than by the Executive.

Finally, his experience of the recent war has convinced him that students as citizens are involved in the general struggle for World Peace.

KEVIN O'BRIEN

KEVIN O'BRIEN, M.Com., a part-time Arts student, has been President since April 1948 and was Secretary till then from January, 1947. He is the student representative-designate to the College Council, was Business Manager of "Salient," 1946, Extrav. Organiser 1948 and 1949, is Treasurer NZUSA, represented VUC on the Resident Executive 1948-49, and at NZUSA meetings last August and this year.

He was a NZUSA representative in Australia at Congress and Council meetings this year. Special VUC and NZUSA committees of which he has been a member in addition to standing and financial ones include: Building Fund Appeal Committee, Jubilee Celebrations Committee, Curious Cove Congress Committee, VUC Physical Education Committee, Exam Fees Committee. He has been President and Treasurer of the Debating Society in which he has won the New Speaker's Prize, Union Prize, Plunket Medal, while he has represented VUC three times in Joynt Scroll, once in Bledisloe Medal and was in this year's NZU debating team against Australia.

He thinks that improvements to the Association Administrative efficiency should still be continued, particularly by the best utilisation of our facilities in the light of recent experience. He believes that the Association exists primarily for the benefit of its own members and that more attention should be paid to this. He thinks it should be our policy to see that there is a minimum of outside publicity for our purely internal affairs, and that this should be part of a sound public relations policy.

Neil Grange

NEIL GRANGE is a part-time Arts student in his fourth year at the College. Mr Grange believes that in the past part-time students in the College have been insufficiently served by the Students' Association.

The students in the College are fundamentally part-timers and their fees make up the bulk of the Students' Association funds. Mr Grange at a recent Special General Meeting called for an investigation of the position with regard to the cafeteria. He was elected to an investigation 'committee and acts as its convener. Mr Grange is firmly opposed to any raising of meal prices above 2/- and hopes that at this rate the quality of meals can be substantially improved. If necessary the cafeteria should be heavily subsidised and grants to over-subsidised College clubs cut down.

A policy statement is an unfortunate necessity when standing for the Executive and I am compelled to list a few minor efforts in the service of the student body as a form of self-defence. I was elected to the retiring Executive and in the handround of Jobs became Gym Controller and the fact that the Gym is still standing is surely proof of care of the Students' Association's major asset. I was elected to the deputation to wait on the Prime Minister amont peacetime conscription and if he consents to receive us we may even yet debate.

I was a delegate from the Association to the NZUSA conference at Anzac week-end, and was Billeting Controller'for the University Tournament at Easter (never again). In addition I have been the Resident Member of the NZUSA Executive and corresponding member with other college Executives on NZUSA bue here.

After a year's experience of Exec-

utive I am a little cautious about sweeping promises to the electorate but my interest in co-operation with overseas, particularly Australian student bodies, has continued and the Vacation Travel and Exchange scheme seems to be the first realisation of this ideal.

BILL HUME, now in his sixth year at Victoria College, is a graduate in Law and Arts and is at present taking Honours in Law.

Bill was a resident of Weir House for four years, served on several committees there and last year was Vice-President of Weir. He has been on the Law Faculty Club and this year was on Headquarters Committee organising Easter Tournament. He favours full support for the Building Scheme, a better cateteria service and more Student Hostels, but under a more efficient management than has produced the present system of bed and breakfast regime at present at Weir.

Conrad Bollinger

Known in Tramping, Debating and Socialist Clubs, and heard of elsewhere, Conrad is a third-year Arts student with several units of a Law degree. He has acted in two Extravs, confessing part authorship of this year's show, "Jubileevit"; was in VUC Drama team, winter 1948; a "Salient" columnist for three years.

His policy is unreservedly antiisolationist, standing for co-operation with student and youth organisations overseas; he believes students can play an important role in safeguarding peace, including opposition to conscription, and that people's money would be better spent on improving library, staffing, building and other facilities in the University-and on a Student Union Building, Stands for a universal student medical scheme, a united stand on board, tramways and other costs affecting students, and student co-operation in College Departmental management.
